

THINGS TO KNOW

Please help Epicenter remain a positive force in Green River by respecting private property and the environment around you, and above all, being kind and friendly to local Green Riverites. EMERGENCIES

On site we have one physician (Steve Sykes), one paramedic (Hollie Smith), and an advanced EMT (Geoff Smith). In the event of a medical emergency, alert them of the incident and call 9-1-1. For non-emergencies you are welcome to seek medical attention from any of the three volunteers above or go to the Green River Medical Clinic & Pharmacy, located on W Main Street here in town M-F 7AM-5PM (435-564-3434). For non-911 issues you can call Emery County Sheriff Dispatch at 435-381-2404 (make sure to note you are in Green River as the county is large).

CARPOOL

Carpooling to and from Summit sites is necessary due to limited parking in many cases. Make a new friend and hop in a car! Wear masks correctly and consistently while in cars with others. Roll down the windows for ventilation while in cars with others. Take your time. Obey speed limits. Do not drive drunk or when drowsy! If you're ever stuck somewhere, send a text on Whatsapp to find a ride.

Road Conditions: Many events will require driving on graded dirt roads. Consider carpooling in cars with high-clearance and 4x4. In the event of heavy rains, conditions will become much more treacherous. Creek bed washes and impassable roads may be a factor for Swasey's Beach. Watch the weather and exercise caution. Local towing options include Shawn O'Keefe (435-225-7299), Steele (435-660-8470), and others.

THE SUN

While the desert can be very cool in the spring, direct sun and low humidity can have severe effects. Bring lots of water, sunscreen, sunglasses, and a shade hat. Wear layers for the chilly mornings and nights.

WIND

Southern Utah can get quite gusty in the spring, especially in the early afternoons. Be sure to tie down your tent and other gear before leaving your camp if camping. Hold on to your hat!

FLASH FLOODS

Flash floods can occur during rainstorms any time of the year. These unpredictable events can drastically change hiking conditions and can quickly become life-threatening. If a storm develops and a flash flood situation is created, get to the highest and safest point possible and steer clear of canyons.

CRYPTOBIOTIC SOIL

Biological soil crust is a living groundcover that forms the foundation of high desert plant life in the surrounding area. This knobby, black crust is dominated by cyanobacteria, but also includes lichens, mosses, green algae, microfungi, and bacteria. Unfortunately, many human activities negatively affect the presence and health of soil crusts. Please walk on trails, on rock, or in sandy washes (where water flows when it rains), and keep all vehicles and bikes on designated roads.

LYRICAL LOCALISMS: SONGWRITING WORKSHOP

Songs often originate from nothing more than a tiny ripple of language: a surprising image, an unfamiliar idiom, a slip of the tongue. In their travels as folksingers and as site-specific artists, Ashley and Brian have found that every single place has its own rich trove of "localisms," everyday sayings that exist only in that particular community and landscape. (For example in Duluth, Minnesota, some locals say "the hawk is out" when the wind off Lake Superior is blowing especially cold and hard.) As it turns out, these sayings can provide ideal starting-points for writing songs of place; in this workshop we'll do some brainstorming of "lyrical localisms" from our own home-places, and then work through the process of building an entire song out of a single phrase.

Ochre is a mineral pigment derived from iron oxide. As the fourth most common element in the Earth's crust - iron is everywhere in our landscapes, but not every rock or soil that appears colorful is a good pigment. He participates regularly in national building code development to lower barriers to the use of sustainable material and has authored multiple building code sections related to earthen construction.

Bolton Colburn is the Curator of Exhibitions and Collections at the Nora Eccles Harrison Museum of Art. He has extensive curatorial and museum leadership experience and specializes in American art in the western United States, particularly in California art. He served as editor and guest curator for NEHMA's 2017 exhibition and catalogue titled Collecting on the Edge. Other projects in recent years include supervising the development of the facility and permanent exhibition for Heroes Hall, a new museum in Orange County California focused on the stories of our veterans. BRIAN LAIDLAW +

Brian Laidlaw is a poet-songwriter who, after completing a PhD in Creative Writing from the University of Denver, now makes his home in Moab, Utah. His previous releases include the poetry collections The Stuntman and The Mirrormaker (Milkweed Editions) and the new vinyl LP This Aster (Fonograf Editions.) Brian is also a co-founder of Unrestricted Interest, an organization offering creative writing mentorship to neurodivergent poets and songwriters. He continues to tour nationally with his band The Family Trade, and moonlights - often literally - as a rock climber.

BRYAN BROOKS + §

Bryan Brooks is a strategist at HUB Collective, a creative agency in Portland, Oregon. He regularly works with clients like the Utah Office of Tourism, Mercy Corps, and rural and urban municipalities from California to Maine solving long-term strategy and vision challenges.

Prior to joining HUB, Brooks served as an Americorps VISTA at Epicenter, facilitating such projects as This Is Green River, HDTS: Epicenter, and A Call to Place. He currently serves on Epicenter's board of directors. He holds an MArch from the University of Washington where he also taught architectural representation studios.

CANDICE CRAVINS +

Candice Cravins is the Executive Director of the John Wesley Powell River History Museum and an AFAA-certified group fitness instructor. She has been teaching group fitness classes in fitness studios and recreation facilities since 2015. She brought group fitness classes to Green River in June 2021 and loves sharing her passion for fitness and wellness with the community!

CHIP THOMAS +

Chip Thomas, aka jetsonorama, is a photographer, public artist and physician who has been working in a small clinic on the Navajo Nation since 1987. There he coordinates the Painted Desert Project which he describes as a community building dialog which manifests as a constellation of murals painted by artists from the Navajo Nation as well as from around the world. Thomas' own public artwork consists of enlarged black and white photographs pasted onto structures along the roadside primarily on the Navajo Nation. His motivation is to reflect back to the community the love they've shared with him over the years. Thomas was a 2018 Kindle Project gift recipient and in 2020 he was one of a handful of artists chosen by the UN to recognize the 75 th anniversary of the UN's founding. Selected artists are to generate work that contributes to the envisioning and shaping of a more resilient and sustainable future. The UN writes "...Right now we are facing the greatest health challenge to the human race in a century. COVID-19 has revealed that a virus can affect not only our physical health but also our ability to cope with the psychological impact in its wake." Thomas will spend 2021 working collaboratively to create art that is a community based response to the pandemic.

CHRIS LEZAMA §

Chris Lezama is a former Epicenter staff member and Green River resident. A long-time advocate for Green River, he now lives in the San Francisco Bay Area, where he is a user experience researcher at Adobe.

CHRIS MERCHANT +

Chris Merchant is a photographer, filmmaker and creative researcher based in Long Beach, California. In his creative practice, he's fascinated by the textures of American regionality—or how local cultures define architecture, lifestyles, and landscapes. In the summer of 2019 Chris participated in the Epicenter Frontier Fellowship, in conjunction with Jennifer Joy Jameson, where they collaborated on a conceptually driven Utah travel guide, forthcoming in Epicenter's Why This Place? publication.

CHRISTY MCBRIDE

Christy McBride serves at the Arts, Culture and Events Division Manager for the City of Ogden. She oversees the operations and management of The Ogden Amphitheater, The Corner Information Center, Ogden City's Public Art Programs as well as Special Event & Film Permitting. Christy and her small team of five work diligently to create an environment that fosters and supports diverse programing in arts and events to enhance the quality of life for residents, resident businesses and visitors. Her Division is housed under Community and Economic Development Department.

Christy's community involvement dates back over 20 years and her influences can be seen in the past, present and future. In 2012, after serving ten years with South Ogden City, she executed the mural paintings of two enormous water tanks that tower over the city. William Tyler is a guitarist and composer living in Los Angeles with deep roots in his native Nashville and Mississippi. He crafts instrumental soundscapes living somewhere between new age, folk, and avant garde classical. While his songs are wordless, he has a deep fascination with history, geography, and the natural world and how the different realms of the cosmic archetypes combine. He has largely released his albums through the North Carolina based independent label Merge and has also done a series of commissioned works for Duke Performances, Big Ears, Le Guess Who, Sydney Festival, as well as collaborated with artists such as Mary Lattimore, Marisa Anderson, pedal steel guitarist Luke Schneider, and Yasmin Williams. He completed his first film score for Kelly Reichardt's "First Cow" in early 2020.
